FY 2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) - AMENDMENT #12

Text of Public Notice as Published in Battle Creek Enquirer, September 11, 2024, p. A4

REQUEST FOR COMMENTS ON TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

THE BATTLE CREEK AREA TRANSPORTATION STUDY (BCATS) HEREBY GIVES NOTICE of opportunity for public involvement in the twelfth amendment to its *Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)* for fiscal years (FYs) 2023-2026 (10/1/22–9/30/26), consisting of the following <u>proposed</u> changes:

1) Modifying the 2025 pavement marking applications by the Michigan Dept of Transportation (MDOT) on selected trunkline segments in the MDOT Southwest Region (SWR) to include both longitudinal and special marking projects, and update budget accordingly for a single Permanent Pavement Marking project. Preliminary engineering (PE) phase cost increased 100% to \$20,000, construction (CON) phase cost increased 37.3% to \$2,890,000. Traffic safety project funded 90% Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), 10% State of Michigan Funds Michigan Betterment "M"; *JN-209623*

2) Abandoning the separate project for 2025 special pavement marking applications by MDOT on selected trunkline segments in the MDOT SWR, and re-directing the project's \$10,000 PE budget and \$310,000 CON budget, and the planned work to the project described previously under item 1; *JN-209624*

3) Increasing the CON budget, based on recent bids, by 36.4% to \$15,000, for MDOT's 2025 pavement marking retroreflectivity readings on selected trunkline segments in the MDOT SWR. Traffic safety project funded 90% Fed HSIP, 10% State "M"; *JN-209634*

4) Modifying MDOT's planned 2026 bridge replacement on M-89 (Washington Ave) over the Battle Creek River, to add road work on M-89 between Dickman Rd and Michigan Ave to support maintenance of traffic during bridge construction, with added funds and a right-of-way (ROW) phase. Overall PE budget increased 35.2% to \$1,253,852, overall CON budget increased 40.4% to \$8,685,049, new ROW phase budget \$50,000. New total budget \$9,988,901; funded 81.85% Fed Bridge Formula Program (BFP) and Surface Transportation Program (STP), 18.15% State "M". Road work will also complement the separate \$1,477,000 bridge capital preventive maintenance (CPM) project on M-89 (Washington) over GTW RR & Kalamazoo River, also planned for 2026; *JN-213719, JN-203293*

5) Adding a 2024 transit capital project for indoor & outdoor electrical upgrades to provide safety & security measures at the pedestrian station platform for intercity bus transportation in downtown Battle Creek. Total budget \$230,000; 80% Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5311, 20% State of Michigan Comprehensive Transportation Fund (CTF); and *JN-221434*

6) Modifying the fifteen locations planned for MDOT's 2025 overband crack fill or asphalt crack treatment, currently over ~56.4 miles of various trunkline segments in the MDOT SWR. Previously selected two locations in BCATS area of I-94BL (M-37) from I-94 to Skyline Dr, and M-96 (Columbia Ave) from Helmer Rd to I-194, are unchanged. CON phase budget for BCATS area work total \$88,000, regionwide total \$1,100,000; 81.85% Fed STP, 18.15% State "M".

JN-219294. 9/13/24, Change Request 3, updated project to add three locations and remove two, including adds in BCATS area, I-194 from I-94 to Golden Ave, and I-94BL (Dickman Rd) from M-37 (Helmer Rd) to I-194. Net total project length increased ~1.17 mi.

The following project was changed administratively as its modification did not meet requirements for the formal amendment process, that would include public noticing and local approval through the MPO process. The adjustment is listed here for information and discussion as appropriate.

7) JN-218784 - Modifying MDOT's 2024 CON phase of installation of pedestrian crosswalk improvements at various crosswalk locations on selected trunkline segments in the MDOT SWR. As stated in the project's JobNet record, Change Request (CR) #11 (approved 8/13/24) "Removed a location to bring within budget and updated the construction dates to match the progress clause. Also increased PE and ROW to match what has been spent." The removed location was 0.138 mi of M-96 (Dickman Rd) between Army St/Tony Tiger Trl and Barberry Dr, in the City of Springfield. The remaining locations include two segments in Kalamazoo, and two in Battle Creek: M-66 (Division St) from the police station driveway northward over the Battle Creek River to Flint St, and M-66 (Capital Ave NE) from Hopkins St (opposite Bailey Park) northward to J Bartlett Dr. PE phase budget increased 13.1% to \$300,000. ROW phase budget increased 8.3% to \$13,000. CON phase budget of \$1,119,126 unchanged (BCATS area work in CON phase \$383,251, Kalamazoo work \$735,875). Funded 90% FHWA Vulnerable Road Users (VRU) program, 8.75% State "M", 1.25% Local Act 51 City.

The Gaza health ministry, which compiles casualty figures, said hospi-tals had so far received 19 bodies. Other victims were still under sand or on roads that rescuers could not reach, it coid said.

The Hamas-run Gaza government media office put the number of fatalities at more than 40. It said that at least 60 others were wounded in the strikes and

many remained missing. Residents and medics said the camp was struck by five or six mi bombs.

The Gaza Civil Emergency said at least 20 tents caught fire.

have been forced from their homes at

Israel savs its forces likely 'unintentionally' killed US activist

Israel's military said it was highly likely its troops fired the shot that killed an American-Turkish woman at a pro-test in the West Bank last week, but said her death was unintentional and ex-

pressed deep regret. U.S. Secretary Antony Blinken said the killing was "unprovoked and unjus-tified" and showed the Israeli security forces needed to make some fundamen tal changes in their rules of engage-


ent. Turkish and Palestinian officials said Friday that Israeli troops shot 26-yearold Aysenur Ezgi Eygi, who had been taking part in a protest against settle-ment expansion during a regular protest march by activists in Beita, a village near Nablus.

Israeli Defense Forces commanders had conducted an investigation into the incident, the military said in a state-

ment on Tuesday. "The inquiry found that it is highly likely that she was hit indirectly and u intentionally by IDF fire which was not aimed at her, but aimed at the key instigator of the riot," the military said. "The IDF expresses its deepest regret

over the death of Aysenur Ezgi Eygi," it

added. U.S. officials had called for a full inhold judgment until Israel presented its finding



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
